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

## Inside The Archives

### Archaeology at the Schoolhouse

While preparing new exhibits for the Little Red Schoolhouse, we found a treasure trove of artifacts.


Big things are in store for the Little Red Schoolhouse in 2024! Next year the building will get a complete makeover: a new roof, scrubbed and repointed brick walls, reimagined exhibits, freshly repainted interior, and schoolhouse style lighting.

While curating the new exhibits several months ago, I pulled five old cardboard boxes from under the current display table. Inside were dozens of objects that had been discovered under the school's floorboards during repairs and improvements in the 1990s.



During the restoration work, the Society conducted archaeological investigations that unearthed a lost world of everyday objects. For more than a

century, people in the Schoolhouse dropped all sorts of things that "fell through the cracks" and remained hidden in the dark, under the floor for generations.



The Little Red Schoolhouse was the city's main school from 1838-1876; until the community had to build much larger schools. So the little building served through the years as an administrative building, school nurse's office, public library, DAR Chapter House, storage area, Red Cross work site, and school museum. Most of the recovered objects date from the mid-1800s to the early 1900s, when the building functioned as part of the school system. Throughout that timeframe, folks lost many possessions un-

Just imagine the anguish of students who lost favorite marbles, or the irritation of their parents at the careless loss of buttons, shoelaces, pencils, rulers, slate wipers, and eating utensils.

Adults lost their fair share of treasured objects as well. Their recovered possessions include keys to the building, pens and mechanical pencils, sewing thimbles, a cigarette

card, a watchchain, and a beautiful sorority brooch. (And we found information about the brooch's owner!)



Next year all of these extraordinary finds will be displayed on interpretive wall panels, plinths, and docent aprons at the back of the schoolroom. You can be sure that we'll have a Grand Reopening and plenty of tours! I do hope that you'll visit the Little Red Schoolhouse after its makeover; there will be lots of lost-and -found treasures to see! (And no, if your third great-grandfather lost his fancy hand-painted marble when he was a schoolboy, you may not have it back!)


